Albertslund

Roskildevej is a road that cuts through the city of Albertslund and is one of the old main roads to Copenhagen. Currently it appears as a noisy massive barrier between the north and south of Albertslund.

Although the city of
Albertslund is known for its
climate and environmental
policies and initiatives,
Roskildevej does not yet
reflect this commitment in its
design.

The city of Albertslund is working to create better connections across

Roskildevej in order to tie the city together.



Allerød

The site in Allerød is an integrated part of an area which has been shaped by 100 years of gravel quarrying and landfill. Today these activities have ceased and the company in charge of the landfill activities leaves the area during 2014. The gravel quarrying and landfill activities have transformed the area and today it contains three minor lakes and two minor hills. Future plans for Lynge Gravel Pit include developing the area into a hot spot for recreational activity in the municipality. The western part of the pit has already been restored as

a recreation site with paths for walking and running, and with a wooden bridge alongside the small lakes.

Herning

The "TimeLine" is a project to develop the closed Vejlevej road and use it for new purposes. The old road of approximately one and a half kilometres runs through the Knudsmosen (the Canute's bog) and will be in the future a unique setting for movement, art, and nature. At the same time it will strengthen the connection between the Herning City Centre, Lind, and the Herning Exhibition Centre.

The vision is that "TimeLine" will offer a wide array of experiences to a large number of users and

contribute to creating life and activity in the area all year round.



Kolding


Kolding has an overall vision called "Kolding—we design for life." Along with the vision, Kolding also stands for ambitious goals regarding environmental management and CO₂ reductions. The site in Kolding is called "Design City Kolding" and is based on three principles:

First, it is going to be a modern and vibrant neighborhood.

Secondly, "Design City Kolding" will become a meeting point between the town of Kolding, the landscape, and the fjord—connecting them.

Finally, sustainability and design are integral elements of the concept of "Design City Kolding."
